93rd edition of the Rains County Fair set to begin Tuesday

Get ready! The 93rd edition of the Rains County Fair rolls into town with the gates opening Tuesday evening, September 12, concluding Saturday night, September 16, with the junior livestock auction followed by a country western dance.

Exhibit buildings will be open daily from 6:00-10:00 p.m. Tues-

day through Friday, and open from 6:00 p.m. until midnight on Saturday. Tickets at the gate are \$4.00 for adults and \$3.00 for children ages 4 through 12. Season passes are \$15.00 for adults and \$11.00 for children ages 4 through 12.

Amusement rides will run each night from 6:00 - 10:00 p.m. A different arm band will be sold for each night for \$25.00 per person.

Tuesday, September 12

All the action begins Tuesday beginning with the youth baked goods contest. Judging begins at 7:00 p.m. in the Creative Arts Building. Tuesday night is also Senior Citizens Night with seniors 65 and up entering the fair grounds for free.

Wednesday, September 13

Junior Livestock entrees are scheduled for arrival beginning at

6:00 a.m. and continuing through hogs. The showing is scheduled to 6:00 p.m. Hog, lamb and goat weigh-ins will be at the fair grounds. Steer weigh-in will be at Mike Willis' farm from 5:00 - 6:00 p.m.

The Junior Miss Rains County Pageant is scheduled to begin at 8:00 p.m. at the Fair Ground Pavilion. The crowning of Miss Rains County 2023 will follow shortly afterwards.

Thursday, September 14

Entries for the Ag Mechanics competition will be accepted beginning at 7:00 a.m. with a silent auction of the works beginning at 8:00 a.m., ending Saturday night after the conclusion of the junior livestock auction.

The junior livestock judging begins at 9:00 a.m. at the Livestock Arena. The steers will show first, followed by lambs, goats, dairy and breeding beef.

The Tiny, Wee, Petite and Little Miss pageants will begin at 6:00 p.m. at the Fair Ground Pavilion.

Friday, September 15

The junior livestock judging concludes with the showing of the begin at 8:00 a.m. at the Livestock Arena.

Friday night is the crowd favorite and highly entertaining Mutton Bustin' contest. Competition is set to begin at 7:00 p.m. at the Livestock Arena.

Saturday, September 16

Saturday kicks off with the traditional County Fair Parade. Line up for the parade is scheduled for 9:30 a.m. at the Emory City Centre, with the parade proceeding at 10:30 a.m.

The traditional chili cook-off judging will begin at 11:00 a.m. at the courthouse square. A youth floral design contest will take place at 3:30 p.m. at the Creative Arts Building.

The fair concludes Saturday evening with the junior livestock auction and a country western dance. Buyer check-in for the auction is 6:00 p.m. with the livestock sale beginning at 6:30 p.m.

An adult baked goods contest will be held in the Creative Arts Building beginning at 7:00 p.m.

Brandon Roberts made the Educational Foundation of RISD a reality

Brandon Roberts is known in Emory as the financial planner at the Edwards Jones office on North Texas Street. But he has also been the "mover and shaker" who brought the Rains Education Foundation to life during the past couple of years.

"I wanted something I could be passionate about that would make a difference in my community," said Roberts. "My wife, Xan, is Director of the Mineola Education Foundation and I have seen the benefits that are a result of that organization."

Roberts was told by Rains ISD Superintendent Jennifer Johnson that people had mentioned the need for an education foundation, but nobody had stepped up to start it. So, he started reaching out to other educa-

tion foundations to see how they started. He also got help from a consulting firm that helps start such organizations. He continued to work with Supt. Johnson and other community people and put together a group, or steering wheel committee to see what they could provide.

"It took about a year before we got our 501(c) charitable designation and got the organization going," said Roberts. "Then we got a grant from Pioneer Foundation. Our first official event was the Back to School Bash this year, but we were raising funds earlier by selling reserve seating for graduation during the past two years. Through networking we are receiving some private donations and we were able to offer our first round of Rains ISD teacher grants last No-



A total of 774 new laws went under state law. into effect on Sept. 1, affecting Texans in many areas of their lives, the Austin American-Statesman reported. The new

laws concern property taxes, registration fees and voting access, among other issues. Several have drawn court challenges from GARY BORDERS opponents.

A few examples of the new law include:

• Book vendors must create a rating system for books deemed 'sexually relevant" or "sexually explicit." House Bill 900 is currently being challenged in an Austin federal courtroom by several Texas book sellers. Other major legislation concerning schools provides nearly \$330 million over the next biennium to increase school safety infrastructure and resources.

• The cost of a new electric car goes up \$400 after Senate Bill 505 passed both chambers unanimously, adding a new registration fee. In addition, owners of existing electric cars now must pay a new \$200 annual registration fee, with the money from both fees going to the state highway fund, which is primarily financed by gasoline taxes.

• Governmental entities in Texas are now banned from implementing COVID-19 restrictions, such as vaccine mandates or requiring the wearing of masks under Senate Bill

Dove season sparks wildfire concerns

With dove season now open in much of Texas, officials with the Texas A&M Forest Service are urging hunters to take special care during activities that could spark a wildfire. Vehicles, trailers, all-terrain vehicles, and other equipment used for hunting and camping often cause wildfires, and bone dry conditions are especially dangerous this hunting season.

As Texans venture outdoors, it's important to remember just how dry the vegetation is. It doesn't take much for an inadvertent spark or carelessness to cause a wildfire," said Chis Schenk, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department statewide fire program leader. "The high temperatures cause fires to spread rapidly and make it hard for firefighters to work. Please enjoy the outdoors but be careful with fire."

Since mid-June, wildfires have burned more than 75,000 acres in Texas, according to the forest service. As of Friday, there were six active fires, most of which have been largely contained. The largest to date was the Shearwood Creek Fire in Jasper County, which consumed 3,562 acres.

There are currently 211 counties across the state with burn bans.


