Board sets aside funds for ladder truck, replace totaled truck

The Rains County Emergency Service District (ESD) board ordered a replacement vehicle for a totaled brush truck and set aside more money for a new ladder truck during the regular Monday, meeting on

December 16.

During the meeting, the board was presented with a quote for a new brush truck to replace the truck at the Point VFD that was totaled in an accident. The quote was for a truck that was in the process of being built which would speed up the delivery date.

The Point VFD did receive a settlement check for about \$45,000 from the insurance company for the totaled truck. The board unanimously approved the motion to purchase the new brush truck for about \$179,000.

Board members considered setting aside more money from the district's fund balance to pay for the ladder truck that had been ordered for the Emory VFD. They had set aside \$500,000 in the budget for the new vehicle, but more funds were still available.

The board was informed that the manufacturer had begun construction of the new ladder truck to replace Emory's current vehicle. They unanimously approved the motion to increase the total money set aside for the new vehicle to one million dollars. Board members looked

over assigned insurance values on the vehicles in the district. They asked the fire chiefs to check the numbers,

make adjustments if needed and return them to the board.

monthly reports for November, Hopkins County reported 168 requests for service, with 60 refusals. Response time on life threatening emergencies in the county was 12 minutes and 36 seconds on average.

Of the 89 transported to a medical facility by EMS, 60 went to Sulphur Springs, 17 to Greenville, eight to Quitman, two to Quinlan and two to other hospitals or air transport. The most common calls were for falls, motor vehicle accidents, a sick person, breathing problems and chest pains.
Emory VFD responded to

109 calls during the month of November. The department responded to 70 medical assists, 12 persons in distress, seven motor vehicle accidents, five fires, four cancelled-in-route calls, four hazardous conditions calls, three service calls, three controlled burns and a false alarm call.

The Point VFD went on 19 medical assists calls, four fires, three motor vehicle accidents, three public service calls, and two gas leaks for a total of 31 requests for service during November.

In the month of November, the East Tawakoni VFD was dispatched on 17 calls including nine medical assists, four fires, a motor vehicle accident, a lift assist, a public assist and a false alarm.

War is hell. Ask anyone who has survived it. They will tell you this, if they can speak about it at all. The Great War, now we call it World War I, was one of the deadliest conflicts in human history. Between July of 1914 and November of 1918 more than 16 million lives were

This was our first "modern" war, where we used machine guns, mechanized tanks, improved artillery, even airplanes and poison gas. Much of the fighting involved trench warfare, with troops dug in and living in muddy, disease-ridden ditches carved from the ground. Between opposing trenches was a "No Man's Land" – littered with barbed wire, dead soldiers, and the refuse of war. In the midst of

this hell on Earth, one cold December night, something astonishing happened. This is the stuff of legend.

On Christmas Eve, 1914, in the area of Flanders, Belgium, along the Western Front, an unlikely miracle took place. Hunkered down in their trenches, British and French troops faced German soldiers on the other side. All was quiet, until one soldier started to sing. Softly at first, then louder,

these words could be heard, "Stille Nacht, Heilige Nacht..." Recognizing the Heilige carol's tune, the British and French troops responded, singing "Silent Night, Holy With binoculars in hand,

a British soldier peering over the parapet spotted twinkling candles in the branches of a small fir tree. The to their trenches, and all too Infantry, 82nd Division, U.S. brating Christmas. As the singing continued, shouting began on either side. One British soldier interviewed years later, said he heard the voice of an enemy soldier, speaking in English with a strong German accent. He was saying, "Come over here." Over the top of their trench, another soldier raised a crudely written sign which read: "YOU NO which read: SHOOT, SHOOT." WE In response, French and British soldiers waved a ragged banner on which they had scrawled "MERRY CHRISTMAS."

Cautiously and nervously the unarmed soldiers rose from their trenches. They crossed "No Man's Land" meeting face-to-face in the frosty cold. Awkwardly, they shook hands and clapped shoulders. Some embraced. Some made an effort to hide their tears. For the rest of the and throughout night,

Christmas Day, they sang carols and exchanged gifts. Chocolate, biscuits, coffee, canned meat, jam, cigarettes, pipe tobacco, pie, and wine were traded back and forth. From somewhere a ball appeared and soon a lively game of football ensued (soccer to us Americans). One German Lieutenant who was there wrote, "How marvelously wonderful, yet how strange it was. The English officers felt the same way about it. Thus Christmas, the celebration of Love, managed to bring mortal enemies together as friends for a time.'


But not everyone was happy about the Christmas Truce. Soon strict orders came down from the high command on both sides. Soldiers were ordered back

soon the fighting resumed News of this Christmas miracle did make it back to England, France, and Germany. Soldiers began sending letters and photos home to their families. Some of these letters and photos were featured in newspapers of the day. This sparked debate about whether or not the truce had impacted morale in the ranks and was actually a good thing.

I would maintain that the Christmas Truce of 1914 was profound evidence of God's supernatural love poured out upon the hearts of men. We all need that. Merry Christ-



The Texas Financial Crimes Intelligence Center (FCIC) and the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR) have additional advice for avoiding credit card skimmers at the gas pump and at other payment devices, and they've gathered it into a PSA on the TDLR YouTube channel: https://youtu.be/M1bhD-P722LU.

Most skimmers have been placed deep inside the gas pump cabinet and it won't be obvious that something's wrong, but there are still some things consumers can check for before using a credit card

That's why over the next few weeks, TxDOT is reaching people as they're buying beverages for holiday gettogethers. TxDOT will bring its mobile interactive exhibit to Walmart stores to engage and remind shoppers about the deadly dangers of drinking and driving.

"It's not okay to drink and drive," said TxDOT Executive Director Marc Williams. "It's not okay for a friend or family member to go through the death of a loved one at the hands of people who are drinking and driving. It's always possible to find a safe and sober ride home, so make it a priority any time

> Yolanda Carson of Mansfield, Texas, knows that pain all too well. She lost her 23-year-old daughter, Jade Jiles, in a 2013 drunk driving-related crash. Jade was rescuing a friend's blind dog who'd run into the street when an impaired driver struck and killed them both.

Our family continues to be devastated by Jade's passing. She had such a bright future ahead of her. She was working two jobs to pay for college, with plans of becoming a teacher. She also had a six-month-old son named Jacob," said Yolanda. "She'll never get a chance to step into the classroom or watch her son grow up. All because someone made the choice of getting behind the wheel after drinking.'

Drunk driving crashes are preventable 100% of the time. If you drink any amount of alcohol, do not get behind the wheel. Designate a sober driver, use a rideshare service or taxi, call a sober friend or family Just ask the friends and member, or use public

transit. You can also just stay where you are until you're

The "Drive Sober. No Regrets" campaign also campaign also includes PSAs on TV, radio, billboards, online and at bars, restaurants and convenience stores statewide. The campaign supports a heightenforcement law period from Dec. 13 through Jan. 1, when more officers will be on the alert looking for drunk drivers on Texas roadways.

"Drive Sober. Regrets" is a key component of #EndTheStreakTX, a broader social media and word-of-mouth effort that encourages drivers to make safer choices while behind the wheel to help end the streak of daily deaths. Nov. 7, 2000, was the last deathless day on Texas roadways.





Paxton files suit against two chemical giants

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton last week filed a lawsuit against chemical behemoths 3M and DuPont, accusing them of misrepresenting the safety of so-called 'forever chemicals," called PFAS, The Tribune reported.

PFAS are a family of chemicals that resist oil, stains, heat, grease, and water. They are called "forever chemicals" because they don't break down and remain in water and soil indefinitely.

The products are sold under brand names such as Teflon, Stainmaster, and Scotchgard. There is mounting evidence they contain chemicals considered harmful to human health.

These companies knew for decades that PFAS chemicals could cause serious harm to human health yet continued to advertise them as safe for household use around families and children," Paxton said in a news release. "Texas is taking action to penalize these companies and hold them accountable for deceiving Texans into buying consumer products without vital information.'

spokesperson DuPont called the lawsuit "without merit... We look forward to vigorously defending our record of safety, health, and environmental stewardship.'

PUC pushing voluntary use of smart thermostats

The Public Utility Commission is providing residential consumers of electricity a way to save on their electricity bills by installing smart thermostats that allow retail electric providers to reduce energy use when demand is

with retail competition.

Ensuring grid reliability as Texas continues to grow requires both expanding our state's power supply and finding ways to reduce demand and use electricity more efficiently," PUCT Commissioner Kathleen Jackson said. "By offering residential consumers opportunities to help them reduce their energy use, we help them save money, reduce demand on the ERCOT system, and improve grid reliability."

Participation is voluntary. The PUC hopes the new rule will strengthen grid reliability by reducing the total power consumption of participating customers by 20%.

November was warmer, wetter than usual

After a hot and dry October, the state for the most part received muchneeded rain in November, though temperatures remained above average for this time of year, according to Mark Wentzel, hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board.

As a result, the percentage the state in drought dropped 24 percentage points by the end of November. However, half of Texas is still in drought, mainly in Far West Texas and a piece of Central Texas around San Antonio.

'November was a welcome from October's statewide record-setting heat and near-record-setting dry-Wentzel Drought conditions are expected to remain relatively stable through the winter months, he added.

Gesundheit! Cedar season underway

It is cedar season in Texas, meaning runny noses and watery eyes especially affecting folks living in Central Texas where juniper trees are prominent.

"Cedar fever is irritating to many due to the quantity and density of Ashe junipers in Central Texas that all produce pollen at the same time, which leads to a high concentration of pollen in the air, said Robert Edmonson of the Texas A&M Forest Service.

Don't feel safe or smug if you live in East Texas. The eastern red cedar also releases pollen around the same time and can provoke similar irritating reactions.

Both types of trees begin producing pollen in mid-December, with production reaching its peak in mid-January, and relief setting in by the beginning of March.

What Happens to Your Debt When You Die?

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can my kids inherit my debt after I die? I have taken on a lot of credit card debt over the

Indebted, In most cases when a person with debt dies, it's their estate, not their kids, that is legally responsible. Here's what you should

Debt After Death

When you die, your estate which consists of the stuff vou own while vou're alive (property, investments and cash) – will be responsible for paying your debts. If you don't have enough cash to pay your debts, your kids will have to sell your assets and pay off your creditors with the proceeds.

Whatever is left over is passed along to your heirs as dictated by the terms of your will, if you have one. If you don't have a will, the intestacy laws of the state you reside in will determine how your estate will be distrib-

If, however, you die broke, or there isn't enough money left over to pay your "unsecured debts" – credit cards, medical bills, personal loans then your estate is declared

insolvent, and your creditors will have to eat the loss.

"Secured debts" – loans attached to an asset such as a house or a car - are a different story. If you have a mortgage or car loan when vou die, those monthly payments will need to be made by your estate or heirs, or the lender can seize the property.

There are, however, a couple of exceptions that would make your kids legally responsible for your debt after you pass away. One is if your son and/or daughter is a joint holder on a credit card account that you owe on. And the other is if either one of them co-signed a loan

Spouses Beware

If you're married, these same debt inheritance rules apply to surviving spouses too, unless you live in a community property state, which includes Arizona, California, Idaho, Louisiana, Nevada, New Mexico, Texas, Washington and Wisconsin. In these states, any debts that one spouse acquires after the start of a marriage belongs to the other spouse too. Therefore, spouses in community property states are usually responsible deceased spouses' debts.

Protected Assets

If you have any IRAs, 401(k)s, brokerage accounts, life insurance policies or employer-based pension plans, these are assets that creditors usually cannot get access to. That's because these accounts typically have designated beneficiaries, and the money goes directly to those people without passing through the estate.

Settling the Estate

You should also make your kids aware that if you die with debt, and you have no assets, settling your estate will be fairly simple. Your executor will need to send out letters to your creditors explaining the situation, including a copy of your death certificate, and that will probably take care of it. But your kids may still have to deal with aggressive debt collectors who try to guilt them into paying.

If you have some assets, but not enough to pay all your debts, your state's probate court has a distinct list of what bills get priority. The details vary by state, but generally estate administrating fees, funeral expenses, taxes and last illness medical bills get paid first, followed by secured debts and lastly, credit card debts.

Hitting Holiday Sales? Use Tap to Pay When Possible to Avoid Credit Card Skimmers

AUSTIN - When you head out to hit the holiday sales with your credit card, make it harder for criminals to steal your hard-earned money -- remember to tap to pay or use a trusted payment app on a mobile phone when possible, instead of swiping or inserting your card into the payment pad.

Texas Financial The Crimes Intelligence Center (FCIC) and the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR) have additional advice for avoiding credit card skimmers at the gas pump and at other payment devices, and they've gathered it into a PSA on the TDLR YouTube channel: https://youtu.be/M1bhD-P722LU.

Most skimmers have been placed deep inside the gas pump cabinet and it won't be obvious that something's wrong, but there are still some things consumers can check for before using a credit card at a gas station:

it loose? Look at the keypad – is it loose or does it look like something has been placed

on top of it? Additional ways consumers can protect them-

• Set card usage or transaction alerts for bank and credit card accounts. Most major banks offer apps that allow real-time monitoring of accounts.

 Regularly monitor credit card and bank statements for fraudulent charges or suspicious transactions

FISHING REPORT

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department released the following information for Fork and Lake Tawakoni taken on December 11:

Fork: Good. Water Stained; 60 degrees; 2.38 feet below pool. The best bass bite is around big timber near channels and drop offs in 4-7 feet with chatterbaits, spinsquare bill crankbaits, Viper XP jigs, or Texas Rigs with creature baits. Report by Marc Mitchell, Lake Fork Guide This week we have fish all

over the lake in depths from 12-58 feet. You can find big numbers of black crappie at the base of shallow trees in 12-18 feet in the mid lake areas. Sometimes you will find white crappie in the same trees suspended halfway down. It is the opposite once you move to deeper water. The black crappie are higher on the trees off shore and the white crappie are further down on the trees. We have seen some bigger crappie in the 2.5 pound range being caught so the winter time big fish season has arrived. The best areas for concentrations of fish are loaded with shad. The bite has been up and down this week but my boat has put the minnow bucket up until next summer. You can still use minnows and

they will produce great. Small hand tied jigs are also working extremely well this week. We should also see the aggressive fish hitting plastics and even large baits as the water cools off. Report by Jacky Wiggins, Jacky Wiggins Guide Service.

Tawakoni: Good. Water lightly stained; 63 degrees; 2.85 feet below pool. Lake Tawakoni has shifted from a fall bite to more of a winter pattern as cold front after cold front continues to cool the water temperatures. The hybrid striper bite has been very up and down the last week. Lots of big wind has made it difficult to fish areas that are holding fish. Swimbaits and slab spoons are working best. Seems like the 10-25 feet range is holding fish. The eating sized catfish bite in the 1-4 pound range is still excellent. Baited holes are working best in 15-25 feet with punch bait. The trophy catfishing continues to improve weekly. Fish are being caught on cut bait in 2-15 feet. The largemouth bite has been good on plastics in 1-6 feet. Slow rolling shallow cranks are still putting fish in the boat but downsizing is working best. Report by Captain Michael Littlejohn, Lake Tawakoni Guide Service.

THIS WEEK IN TEXAS HISTORY

Mysterious Death of a Comic Genius

Ted Healy, the comic genius behind "The Three Stooges," kissed his wife and three-day old baby goodnight on December 20, 1937 and headed for his favorite Hollywood haunts to celebrate the birth of his first child.

The name on the future comedian's birth certificate was "Ernest

Lea Nash" or

"Clarence

Lee Nash.'

there is no doubt that it was issued in 1896 in the town

of Kaufman east of Dallas. By the time little Ernest (or Clarence) was ready for school, the Nash family was living in Houston. He was 12 when they moved to New York City in 1908. Dazzled by the bright lights of Broadway, the teenager decided his future was in the exciting world of show business rather

than on the nine-to-five

treadmill of his coat-and-tie

father. Ernest/Clarence was a few months shy of his sixteenth birthday, when he took the vaudeville plunge. Joined by pal Moses Ĥorwitz, the future Moe Howard, he talked their way into male supporting roles in a water act called "Annette

Kellerman's Diving Girls." The two friends soon found themselves out of work after one of the featured females broke her neck in a poorly timed dive. The New Yorker and the Texan went their separate ways, but before long the latter was back on stage as a comedian with a new name.

Ted Healy was a huge hit right from the start. By the early Twenties, he was the highest paid performer on the vaudeville circuit earning a whopping \$9,000 a week. (Keep in mind the inflation of the past century makes the 1920 dollar worth \$100 today!) He was, however, no longer alone in the footlights having added his new bride and a dog.

Healy reunited with Moe Howard in 1922, when he hired his old sidekick as a "stooge," an audience member secretly a part of the act. Moe's brother Shemp was brought on-board the next year as a heckler followed in 1925 by Larry Fine, a violinist in real life.

Night after night Healy and his stooges had packed houses rolling in the aisles with the violent slapstick humor that had become their trademark. But by the end of the decade, Healy's drinking was out of control and the reason Shemp

Moe replaced his unhappy brother with another sibling whose stage alias was Curly. The Howards and Fine tolerated Healy's alcoholism but could not stomach his stingy refusal to share the wealth. The trio permanently ended the one-sided relationship in 1934 upon learning their weekly hundred-dollar stipend, which had to be split three ways, came out of the \$30,000 Healy was pulling down.

There was animosity for awhile - Healy even sued his protégés for supposedly stealing his material – but mutual success softened the hard feelings. The Stooges were cracking up the country with their side-splitting films for Columbia, while Healy branched out into drama at MGM and had just signed a fat new contract with Warner Brothers in late 1936.

That same year, the screen actor married a woman almost half his age. Ever the impulsive type, Healy proposed to Betty Hickman within minutes of meeting the college coed, and the couple tied the knot in an Arizona ceremony after a midnight elopement.

According to Moe Howard, Healy had always wanted children. ""He used to visit our homes and envied the fact that we were all married and had children," the Stooge wrote. "He loved kids and often gave Christmas parties for underprivileged youngsters and spent hun-

The birth of his son John in December 1937 was a dream come true for the wannabe dad. When visiting hours was over five nights before Christmas, he caught a cab for the Sunset Strip to spread the wonderful news and to buy drinks all around.

By the time Healy arrived at The Trocadero, he was already as drunk as the proverbial skunk. What happened next depends upon

who you believe. In the official and widely accepted version, Healy got into a fight with three anonymous college boys in the parking lot of The Trocadero. He sustained serious injuries and despite the best efforts of his doctor and cardiologist died at home the next day.

In the unofficial but likely more accurate version, Healy argued with actor Wallace Beery, Albert Broccoli (the producer who made his fortune with the Bond movies) and a third man at The Trocadero bar. After Beery threw the first punch, Healy invited him outside to settle the matter.

But Broccoli, who had slipped out the door, was waiting and grabbed Healy in a bear hug. Beery proceeded to beat his helpless opponent to within an inch of his life before leaving him half-conscious in a pool of his own

Hollywood in those days was a company town, where the studios called the tune and everyone - cops, courts and newspapers included – danced to it. MGM was not about to let a box-office draw like Wallace Beery be tainted by scandal much less stand
