City loans money to water/sewer department, appoints interim officials

The Emory City Council loaned money to the water department and appointed an interim police chief and city administrator during its regular meeting on Tuesday, October 14.

During the meeting, the council was presented with a resolution that would loan the City of Emory Water and Sewer department \$180,000 from the city's general fund. The funds for the department were low as they finished work at the corner of Hwy. 69 and Hwy. 515. They anticipate recuperating the \$180,000 from sewer connection fees from commercial properties,

but the properties will need to sell first.

The money can not be transferred from the city's general fund to the department. The city will have to loan the money and collect interest on the debt. The resolution set a five-year term on the loan to the water-sewer department and it will pay back the general fund monthly with interest.

The resolution to loan the money to the department from the general fund was unanimously approved by the

Council members adjourned into executive session for about 15 minutes discuss personnel matters. Upon re-

Council discusses water notification issues, remodeling of community center

The Point City Council discussed issues with emergency water shutoff notifications, upcoming remodeling of Point Community Center and changed bank account signatories during the regular meeting on Tuesday, October

During the meeting, Cora Mae Moore and Penny Whitrock spoke to the council concerning issues that arose when the water was shut off on September 25

Moore, a hair stylist, had a client with chemicals in their hair and needed water to remove them. She stated that

she had received no notification of the water being shut off and had to search for solutions to help her client.

When she contacted Point City Hall to determine what had happened, Moore was informed by City Secretary Heather Rollins that a water main pipe had broken and water was shut off for repair. Rollins noted that it was later determined that a new employee had inadvertently shut off water to the whole city and not just the area in need

Moore asked why they hadn't been notified and Rollins stated that an alert had been sent through text message

RAINS COUNTY ESD

District orders two tankers, replaces windows at EMS station

The Rains County Emergency Service District (ESD) board held a regular meeting on Monday, October 20, to order two new tanker trucks and approve replacement of windows at the EMS Station.

During the meeting, the board discussed proposals for new tanker trucks for the Emory VFD and Point VFD. Emory had planned to buy a new truck and send the existing truck to Point, but Point secured a grant for \$300,000 towards their own tanker truck.

The quote for the vehicles was around \$724,946 each. The plan was changed to ask for tankers for each department with the existing truck moving to East Tawakoni.

When asked about grants for the East Tawakoni VFD, they stated that plans were to get a tanker as well, but decided a brush truck would be more beneficial to the community.

The board unanimously approved the purchase of two tanker trucks for Emory and Point.

Board members reviewed bids to replace windows in the EMS building on East Lennon Drive. A representative from Hopkins County EMS offered their opinion on which bid they preferred. The board unanimously approved the bid to replace 11 windows at the station for \$12,200.

The board approved a yearly incentive pay for volunteer firefighters in the amount of \$39,750.

In monthly activity reports for September, the Emory VFD was dispatched on 94 calls including 62 medical assists, ten good intent calls, eight fires, six motor vehicle accidents, four false alarms, three service calls and a hazardous condition.

Point VFD responded to 50 calls dur-

ing the month of September. The department responded to 33 medical assists, seven public service calls, four fires, five good intent calls and a motor vehicle accident.

The East Tawakoni VFD went on 16 medical assists calls, a motor vehicle accident and a lift assist call for a total of 18 requests for service during Septem-

All board members were present for the regular meeting.

The next regular meeting of the Rains County ESD Board is scheduled for Monday, November 17, at 6:30 p.m. at the Emory VFD Fire Station.

> Recently, a slice of Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip's wedding cake from 1947 sold for \$3,669. It was purchased by Gerry Layton and is one of the last pieces of cake from this wedding in existence. Despite its rarity, Layton plans to eat it. Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip's confection was a nine-foottall elegant baked monster of a cake weighing over 500 pounds. It was cut into 2000 pieces. In 2013 another Queen Elizabeth slice sold for \$2,300, auctioned by

> Christie's. And just like in the Seinfeld episode, in 1998 a slice from Edward VIII and Wallis Simpson's wedding sold for \$29,900. Initially valued at \$500-\$1000, the

buyer, entrepreneur Benjamin Yin, explained he bought the cake for sentimental reasons. "It represents the epitome of a great romance - truly romantic and elegant," he said.

With my curiosity piqued, I went online in search of vintage cake for sale. For the heady price of \$3,400 I found a royal wedding cake collection set. This consisted of three rare slices of official royal wedding cake, each Diana. Another slice came from the wedding of Princess Anne and Captain Mark Phillips. The third was from Prince Andrew and Sarah Ferguson's wedding. All are fruitcake, with special cream cheese frosting on the Charles and Di slice. The collection was offered for sale from the family of a former member of the Queen's official bodyguard unit. Each piece comes wrapped in its original wax paper inside a monogramed silver presentation box with a signed letter of authenticity. If you are a royalist, or maybe just have an online shopping addiction, this antique cake can be yours

FISHING REPORT

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department released the following information for Lake Fork and Lake Tawakoni taken on October 15:

Good. Normal Fork: stain; 84 degrees; 1.86 feet below pool. Bass are good with yellow magic and buzzbait topwaters around grass, and rage swimmers around grass in 1-4 feet of water. Carolina rigs are good on points and tree lines in 10-12 feet of water. Bass are fair with deep crankbaits in 22-25 feet on long points. Shad patterned baits are best.

Black Bass are beginning to school in open water. Fly fish with small top water patterns. Cooler nights will drop water temperatures and bass will move shallower. Streamers are enticing bass early and late. Bream are shallow, try small hoppers.

Lake Fork crappie fishing

is getting better and better as we head into fall. Fish are beginning to stack up and feed well. Black crappie are loading up at the base of trees, some brush piles, underwater bridges and we should see them on bridges soon. Look for those fish in 13-22 feet of water. White crappie are loading up on trees and brush piles in 13-32 feet and should be moving towards the dam and deeper water soon. Minnows are working well and small hand tied jigs are also producing. We have had good luck with larger minnows threaded onto 1/16 ounce jig heads for white crappie on timber. Soft plastics should also get you bit as water temperatures drop down.

lightly stained; 80 degrees; ferring fast moving shallow

Tawakoni continues to fish well as we begin to see the first signs of the lake turning into some fall patterns. The hybrid striper and white bass bite are good. The fish are moving hard looking for good pockets of water. Fish main lake points in 8-15 feet using inline spinners and slab spoons. The eating sized catfish bite is still red hot. Easy limits on half day trips are the standard right now. Baited holes in 12-20 feet using prepared baits such as punch or dip baits. The trophy blue catfish are beginning to feed. We have seen fish in the 20-30 pound range on medium sized pieces of cut baits in 10-25 feet. Crappie are improving under bridges and on shallow brush with the bite on minnows. Largemouth bass Tawakoni: Good. Water extremely shallow and pre-

How to Use Medicare's Star Ratings **System During Open Enrollment**

Shopper Dear Shopper, If you're shopping and comparing Medicare Advantage plans (the alternative to original Medicare) or Part D prescription drug plans during the open enrollment (Oct. 15 – Dec. 7), you'll likely find a dizzying number of options to choose from. The Medicare star rating system is a terrific tool to help you narrow down your choices. Here's what you

Understanding Star Ratings

should know.

The Medicare star ratings, which you'll find in the Medicare's online Plan Finder tool at Medicare.gov/ plan-compare, offers a shorthand look at how Medicare Advantage and Part D plans measure up for quality and member experience.

In this annual rating system, five stars means excellent, four means above average, three means average, two means below average, and one means poor.

Medicare Advantage plans (but not Part D plans) that get at least a four-star rating get bonus payments from Medicare, which they can use to provide extra

You should also know that plans that get fewer than Medicare Advantage are

three stars for three consecutive years, can be terminated by Medicare, so plans are incentivized to keep their quality up. Such low-performing plans show up on Plan Finder with an upsidedown red triangle that has an exclamation point inside.

People in these low-performing plans can switch to ones rated three stars or better during Medicare's Special Enrollment Period for Disenrollment, which is between Jan. 1 and Dec. 31.

How Ratings Are Comprised

Part D and Medicare Advantage star ratings comprised up to 40 or 30 quality and performance measures, respectively. Ratings for both types of plans are based partly on member experience, customer service, and plan performance. Part D ratings also assess

prescription drug safety and pricing, while Medicare Advantage ratings also look at whether members are staying healthy and if ones with chronic conditions get the tests and treatments typically recommended to them.

Be aware that five-star plans are few and far between. The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) has revised the Medicare star rating methodology in recent years, making it extremely hard for a plan to earn five stars.

In 2025, just 2 percent of Medicare people with Advantage/Part D plans and 5 percent in stand-alone Part D plans have five stars. Four-star plans are much easier to find, as more than 70 percent of people with

enrolled in them.

Shopping Tips

Here are some tips to consider when evaluating Medicare Advantage and Part D star ratings during open enrollment:

• Don't choose or reject a Medicare Advantage or Part D plan only because of its star rating. Costs and access to services or health providers should be your top priority when choosing a plan. But a star rating could be your deciding factor when choosing between two plans with similar out-of-pocket costs and coverage.

• Don't panic if a plan's 2026 star rating is slightly lower than its 2025 rating. The downgrade could be due to a blip in the way the ratings are computed from year to year. It's best to look at a plan's star-rating history over several years.

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

The score at the end of the first quarter was already 35-14 with a total of 28 plays run by both teams. The shortened game had 50 total plays in the first half, but only 20 plays in the second
